Welcome to the 4th annual KINOFEST Seattle, presented by the Portland German Film Festival (PGFF) in collaboration with the Northwest Film Forum (NWFF).

Join us at the Northwest Film Forum from October 22 – November 5, 2019 for a fantastic line-up of contemporary and classic German language films from Germany, Austria, and Switzerland, presented in German with English subtitles.

KINOFEST Seattle opens with BALLOON (Ballon), based on the true story of one of the most spectacular escapes from communist East Germany.

Other features include the epic biopic BRECHT (Brecht) about the life of writer Berthold Brecht, as well as Sönke Wortmann's last hit HOW ABOUT ADOLF? (Der Vorname).

In addition, there are family-friendly features including; ALFONS JITTERBIT – COUNTDOWN TO CHAOS (Alfons Zit-

terbacke: Das Chaos ist zurück), and ROCCA CHANGES THE WORLD (Rocca verändert die Welt), which received the German Film Award 2019 for Outstanding Children or Youth Film. Switzerland is represented The Reformer. ZWINGLI: A Life's Portrait (Zwingli) and the documentary FAIR TRADERS. The highlight of the festival is Bruno Ganz's last movie The Tobacconist (Der Trafikant), based on the international bestseller by Robert Seethaler.





THE REFORMER: ZWINGLI -**A LIFE'S PORTRAIT**

October 28 • 8:00 p.m • Switzerland Directed by Stefan Haupt • 123 min.

Zurich, 1519. Arriving with nothing but his impassioned eloquence and radical ideas (e.g. clerics should be free to marry who they choose—radical even today), a young priest sparks a revolution that would challenge the Catholic stronghold over the people, reforming a faith, a nation, and the world. Based on the extraordinary life of Ulrich Zwingli, this lush historical epic reveals how one man's powerful words and deeds took aim against the tyranny of the time and its suffocating religious strictures. Amid charges of blasphemy and heresy, Zwingli's denunciation of Biblical hypocrisy slowly begins to sway others to his side, including Anna, a devout widow with a passion for learning. As Zwingli's controversial positions advance the city toward civil war, his deep bond with Anna is at stake. Multiple award-winning director Stefan Haupt (The Circle) and lead actor Maximilian Simonischek (The Divine Order) craft an intensely vibrant reconstruction of a pivotal moment in Swiss history and an incendiary romance set amid a period of intense transition.

ALFONS JITTERBAG -**COUNTDOWN TO CHAOS**

October 29 • 6:00 p.m • Germany Directed by Mark Schlichter • 54 min.

What would Alfons Zitterbacke give to be a great athlete, a super student and an astronaut, just like Alexander Gerst. But that isn't what his world looks like. The 11-year-old stumbles from one mishap to the next. Everyone seems to gang up on him. Unfair teachers, vicious classmates and a very strict father generally make life miserable for him - when out of the blue an aircraft competition offers the opportunity to participate in an astronaut camp and Alfons sees his chance: At last he can show the world what a brilliant inventor he is - particularly Emilia, the new girl in class. The only trouble is that Alfons' rival, Nico, also decides to take part in the competition and challenges him to a duel. In his dilemma, Alfons drags his best friend Benni, into the affair, and now there's no way out: They have to win the competition. But how?

Alfons Jitterbag is an action-packed comedy about friendship, outer space, fathers and sons and the best plans for building rockets.







(Der Vorname)

October 29 • 8:00 p.m • Germany Directed by Sönke Wortmann • 91 min.

"What's in a name?" Shakespeare's lofty question takes on new life in this savage comedy which raucously lampoons contemporary German attitudes, guilt and denials of the Nazi past, When Thomas (Florian David Fitz), the black sheep of a progressive middle-class academic family, surprises his siblings with the news that he intends to name his son Adolf, petty carnage ensues as personal, ideological and sexual histories are unmasked in this scintillating dark comedy. A breakout German box office hit (a noteworthy factoid deserving of its own cultural analysis), this send-up of social respectability and appearances shows as much of an awareness of Germany's current shifting political landscape and reactionary views as it does an understanding of the tense interpersonal dynamics between siblings and in-laws. With a marvelous screenplay that is biting, quick, frequently genuinely shocking and deserving of comparison to Yasmina Reza's best satiric plays, How About Adolf? is an enjoyable excursion into bourgeois infighting and mayhem. At this dinner table, sociability starts out as just a smile, and a smile is just teeth.



November 4 at 3:00 Directed by Heinrich Breloer Germany/Austria • 187 minutes

Heinrich Breloer's biographical film of writer Bertolt Brecht, is a hybrid of fiction and documentary. Brecht's art reflects his inner conflict and is closely linked to the political upheavals of the time. Following Brecht's life from the beginning of World War I to his death, Breloer concentrates on Brecht's relationships with women and colleagues at the Berliner Ensemble. Excerpts from interviews with Brecht's first love Paula Banholzer, directors Egon Monk and Manfred Wekwerth, actor Regine Lutz and many others contribute to this portrait of the icon of political theatre as a combative, loving and conflicted contemporary.



ROCCA CHANGES THE WORLD (ROCCA – VERÄNDERT DIE WELT)


November 5 • 6:00 p.m • Germany Directed by Katja Benrath • 100 min.

With never-ending optimism Rocca proves together with her friends, that even a child has the power to change the world.




